Lowenstein's representation of the Unsecured Creditors' Committee of Parent Company of Balducci's New York and Kings Food Markets in the confirmation of the Plan filed by the Debtors and approved by the court on February 22 is noted in the **Global Legal Chronicle** and **PBV Monitor**. Craig Dashiell and 2019 summer associate Yelky Perez are featured in **NJ.com** and **Chron's** coverage of Perez's establishment of a book scholarship for first-generation law students at Rutgers Law School. Perez discusses how her idea to provide funds to subsidize the purchase of law books for students in Rutgers' Minority Student Program (MSP) became a reality with the support of the firm. Dashiell, a Rutgers alumnus and an MSP member like Perez, says, "The firm is supportive of these kinds of things. ... It's great when it

> April 29, 2019

Reuters and **Law360** highlight Lowenstein Sandler's filing of a class action lawsuit in the U.S. District Court for the District of New Jersey against various federal agencies and their leaders on behalf of young immigrants wrongfully disqualified from receiving Special Immigrant Juvenile Status (SIJS). According to the suit, the plaintiffs' SIJS applications were unfairly denied because they were between 18 and 21 years old when they obtained child welfare findings from a state juvenile court, a necessary predicate to applying for SIJS. At least 100 other immigrants in New Jersey are facing similar denials. (The Lowenstein team included: **Catherine Weiss**, **Natalie J. Kraner**, **Craig Dashiell**, Eric R. Suggs, **Tracy F. The **New Jersey Business & Industry Association** quotes **David Leit** and mentions **Gavin J. Rooney** and **Craig Dashiell** in an article discussing the uncertain future of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program, despite the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas denying the plaintiff states' request for a preliminary injunction to halt the program. Leit, who, along with Rooney and Dashiell, led the Lowenstein team that authored and filed an amicus brief supporting the State of New Jersey's opposition to the injunction, notes that the amicus brief's principal argument, that suddenly halting DACA would cause significant economic harm to New Jersey businesses and organizations, was accepted by the Court as a basis to deny the injunction.

ROI, **NJBIZ**, the **New Jersey Business & Industry Association**, and **NorthJersey.com** highlight Lowenstein Sandler's leading role in authoring and filing an amicus brief in *State of Texas, et al. v. United States of America, et al.*, on behalf of New Jersey businesses, associations, and nonprofit institutions, supporting the State of New Jersey's opposition to Texas's motion to preliminarily enjoin the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program in a case pending in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas. The brief highlights the significant harms to the New Jersey economy and New Jersey businesses that would result if DACA were enjoined and thousands of New Jerseyans suddenly became unable to contribute to the state's economy by working, attending school, and paying taxes. **David Leit**, **Gavin J.
